The Historic Bridges of Aberdeen

Aberdeen is fortunate to have many historic bridges some of which are still in use today.

The first bridge to review is the Wellington Suspension Bridge

Built in 1830 and designed by Captain Samuel Brown and City Architect John Smith. The metalwork was manufactured by James Abernethy at the Ferryhill Foundry



on the banks of the river. The span of the bridge is 217ft and cost £10,000. The chains on which the bridge is suspended are original and based on the Thomas Telford design used on the Menai Suspension Bridge in Anglesey. Captain Brown a naval captain had been a supplier of chains to the Navy and was also the designer of the Union Chain Bridge over the river Tweed a much larger span of 449ft which was completed in 1820 at a cost of £7,700 a third of the cost of a stone bridge.

Union Bridge

This is the largest single span bridge in the world 130ft constructed in 1805 as part of the Union Street plans by Charles Abercrombie. Initially a three-span bridge by Rennie was proposed.



Telford proposed a span of 150ft and Thomas Fletcher the 130ft. After deliberations and involvement with Telford the 130ft span was constructed. In 1908 the bridge was widened on both sides with a three pinned steel arch with new parapets surmounted by Kelly's Cats.

Bridge of Dee

Originally built in 1514 from a bequest from Bishop William Elphinstone it was virtually all rebuilt in 1723 and widened from 14ft to 26ft in 1841. The widening involved the careful



dismantling of the whole of the west face of the bridge including turrets abutment and wing walls spandrels and arch stones. The project was designed and executed under the direction of the City Architect John Smith.

The Bon Accord Baths

July 2020 will, hopefully, be seen as a turning point in the campaign to save the Bon Accord Baths. This was the date when Bon Accord Heritage, after five years of negotiations with the Council, signed a License to Occupy agreement and got keys to the Baths. Since then, we have organised two open day weekends for the public. The September 2020 open days were the first opportunity for the public to see inside the building since it closed in 2008, and over 1600 people attended, with a long, socially distanced line stretching down Justice Mill Lane. We heard many interesting stories about the Baths – one visitor had been at their opening in 1940 – but it was not only nostalgia, as we raised over £10,000 in donations. There is no doubt that Aberdonians want the Baths open!

The feasibility of running the Baths remains the big question, and we are now undertaking professional feasibility planning, which should be complete by the end of the year. In the meantime, we have been doing essential maintenance (clearing gutters and roof drains, blocking broken windows) and carrying out daily security checks, so that the condition of the Baths does not deteriorate further while our plans take shape. We have also continued cleaning up the interior of the Baths, with the intention of opening up more of the building for each open day.

The next open days will be on 27/28 November 10am - 2:30pm, with Bon Accord Baths themed Christmas cards and gifts on sale. We hope to see you there!
